Message from the Superintendent

Welcome to 2020! The 2019-2020 school year is rapidly moving along, and while it is hard to believe, the first trimester has been completed in the Elementary School, and our Middle/High School classes are starting preparations for mid-term exams.

At this year's first Superintendent's Conference Day, the entire faculty and staff joined together to participate in our "Opening Ceremonies" and usher in the start of the new school year. As part of our opening day, I try to advance a yearly theme for our faculty and staff. This year my theme was "Respecting Everyone's Story." I challenged the faculty and staff to reflect on the philosophy and mission statement of one of the most successful fast food restaurants in the world; Chick-Fil-A, and consider how we could apply those principles to the Hartford Central School Central District.

Chick-Fil-A produces quality meals at a reasonable price, but their success is rooted in their customer service platform of 'going the second mile.' Chick-Fil-A has built their enterprise on transforming their customer service model from one in which the customer is the object of sale, to one where the customer is the subject of an experience. They believe that when a customer enters their restaurant, you never know what is going on in their life, or what path they took to get to there, and then focusing their attention to the customer and their experience. This philosophy is reflective of Henry David Thoreau's famous quote "Could a greater miracle take place than for us to look through each other's eyes for an instant?" Chick-Fil-A asks their employees to respect their customer's stories, to put themselves in their customer's shoes, and create a lasting and positive experience that goes beyond a good chicken sandwich. To that end, I challenge our faculty and staff to take this idea and apply it to our district.

MESSAGE FROM PRINCIPAL MANNIX

Dear Parents, Guardians and Community Members,

I would like to thank all of you who attended Open House on Thursday, September 26. We had an overall attendance rate of 83% for grades Pre-K-5. Involvement in your child's education will have positive long-term effects on their academic success. Research indicates that students with involved parents earn higher grades and test scores, attend school regularly, have a more positive attitude about school and better social skills, have fewer behavior problems, have increased self-esteem, consistently complete their homework, and are more likely to graduate and pursue post-secondary education. I encourage parents to share goals for their children with teachers and have conversations about how to be involved in school.

One of our goals at the elementary level is to recognize as many students as possible for their accomplishments. Kindergartners through fifth grade students meet in the cafeteria on the last school day of each month and are recognized for upcoming birthdays, Citizens' of the Month, Bus Riders of the Month, Bucket Fillers, Soaring Tanagers, the class that has collected the most "bus hands" for positive behavior, Chronicle entries, involvement in organizations/activities outside of school, participants in school related events, Star Reporters for our elementary Newspaper Club, student successes, etc. This is a wonderful opportunity for us to recognize students and remind them about the great things they are doing to make our school and community a better place! We are off to a great start in recognizing many students during these first four months of school.

We had some visitors in the building in October to discuss fire safety, as October is Fire Prevention Month. Thank you to the Hartford firefighters who provided demonstrations and valuable information about fire safety on Friday, October 11. (See photos on page 15). I hope every family takes the time to create a home fire escape plan, check their smoke detectors and remind children about important fire safety rules. Here are a few of the highlights of the 2019-2020 school year thus far:

Classroom News:

- After a unit on topography and creating our own topographic maps of mountains we built, the 6th grade class hosted a guest speaker. Students asked great questions and took a close look at printed topographic maps of projects that Mr. Happy's company is working on.
- The art department hosted a guest speaker from Maine College of Art and Design to present information about their school and various careers in art.

Over 200 students from 28 school districts attended. The conference was organized by a committee of students from Hartford, Fort Ann, Granville, Warrensburg and Whitehall. The planning committee members from Hartford Central School District were Emmaline Barker (grade 10), Alexander Holcomb (grade12), James Lavin (grade 10), and Kathryn Smith (grade 12). In addition to the four students who served on the planning committee, Hartford students Abigail Barker (grade 6), Jacob Fish (grade 11), and Reagan Gebo (grade 7) attended the conference. Alexander Holcomb, who attended and served on the planning committee for several years, was selected to provide the welcominig remarks this year.

The conference is designed to have students interact and collaborate with their peers from other school districts. Even the table seating is purposely designed to bring students from other districts together and break away from the comfort of friends and familiarity. Throughout the morning students participated in a number of team building activities.

This year's theme was "You Paint The Way" with keynote speaker Ben Glenn. Mr. Glenn spoke about his dyslexia and other learning disabilities that he was diagnosed in grade school, and being different from his peers. Mr. Glenn learned how to channel his artistic abilities to express himself. He awed the students in creating and completing a bed sheet size chalk drawing in just thirteen minutes.

On Wednesday, December 3, Hartford CSD students grades 10-12 learned about the dangers and consequences of distracted driving. Jacy Good and Steve Johnson, who are advocates for distraction-free roads, travel to schools and other public forums to share their heart-breaking and life altering tragedy as a result of a distracted driver. To date they have delivered their "Hang Up And Drive" message approximately 1,046 times in 41 states and 3 countries.

This is their story - On May 18, 2008 after leaving Jacy's college graduation ceremony, she and her parents were traveling home together. They approached a green light on a relatively busy one-lane highway while an 18-year-old man talking on his cell phone approached the red light at the intersecting road. Unfortunately, he was paying more attention to his cell phone conversation than his driving environment and failed to notice the red light. As he entered the intersection, an oncoming tractor trailer swerved to miss the distracted driver, but hit the Good family's car with full-force instead. The impact killed Jacy's mother Jean, and father Jay. When the paramedics arrived Jacy wasn't breathing and was resuscitated by an EMT who was in close proximity and heard the horrible crash. Once transported to a hospital, Jacy was given about a 10 percent chance of surviving the night. She defied the odds and slowly recovered from her numerous injuries including multiple broken bones, a lacerated liver and a traumatic brain injury. Even after multiple surgeries and physical rehabilitation Jacy is partial paralyzed with limited use of the left side of her body.

Jacy spent about four months in the hospital with her college sweetheart and now husband, Steve at her side, as well as her older and only brother, Jerrod. Once out of a coma, she awoke to learn that with the loss of her mother and father, her family had been cut by half. She said she had no memory of the accident and was not aware of any details. She conducted a Google search of her name and was horrified to find out that the crash was caused because a driver was on his cell phone. It should be noted that when Jacy and Steve tell their story, they refer to it as a crash rather than an accident. "This was no accident. This was totally preventable and a result of poor judgement," said Steve. The husband and wife team also identified other forms of distracted driving. "Distracted driving is anything which takes the mind off the road. Our brains are not designed to multi-task. Scientfically, the brain can only multi-toggle," stated Jacy.

The presentation was coordinated by the Washington County Sheriff's Office and Lauren Zimmerman-Meade, New York State Coordinator for SADD. The funding is provided by the New York State Governor's Traffic Safety Commission.

LEARNING THROUGH LIVING HISTORY

Mrs. Bonnie Winchester's English 10 class hosted Mr. Lee Winchester as a guest presenter. Mr. Winchester was an Army combat platoon leader who served in Vietnam. His visit complemented the curriculum, as the students are just finishing "The Things They Carried," a collection of short stories about a platoon of American soldiers fighting on the ground in the Vietnam War, written by Tim O'Brien.

Mr. Winchester, a retired high school science teacher in Vermont, was right at home in front of the students. He began

his visit by giving the students the history of what led up to the Vietnam War. Mr. Winchester was drafted upon graduating from college in 1966. At age 24, he was considered the "old man" in comparison to the soldiers he was responsible for. Mr. Winchester engaged the students by asking them to share the images and thoughts that come to mind about the war. The students asked many excellent questions such as means of travel, the weather and terrain conditions, the food, and more. They discussed what

was going on politically, socially, and musically, and how these various elements all connected. They also discussed the struggles many soldiers faced when they returned home.

Mr. Winchester brought his Army helmet, which was surprisingly heavy, and many students deemed would be unpleasant to wear for any length of time. He also had a P38 can opener, issued in canned food ration boxes, which consisted of freeze dried and

canned foods which Mr. Winchester described as, "Delicious, so long as you were really hungry." The ration kits also included coffee, toilet paper, and other essentials for survival in the field. The students appreciated hearing about what they are learning in a book from a soldier who actually experienced and lived it.

Mr. Winchester is uncle to Mrs. Bonnie Winchester's husband.

Winter Safety Tips

- 1. Never play on snow banks on or near the road.
- 2. Never build snow forts or snow tunnels.
- 3. Never sled on snow banks or hills near the road.
- 4. Never assume ponds, rivers, or lakes are frozen even if they appear to be.
- 5. Dress properly. Wear bright clothing. Hats, winter coats and boot will keep you warm and safe from frost bite. Be sure to tuck in loose clothing such as scarves and strings.
- 6. Play outside with at least one other person. Be sure to answer adults/siblings/friends if they call for you.

- 1. Allow extra time to get to your bus stop.
- 2. Wear bright clothing so the bus driver can see you in the early morning and late evening.
- 3. Stand away from where the bus stops. Buses need extra room to stop when there is snow and ice.

Waiting at the Bus Stop

- 1. Don't play in the snow while waiting for the bus.
- 2. Don't throw snowballs at the bus or anyone else.
- 3. Don't slide on the snow or ice patches in driveways or on the street.
- 4. Don't push or shove around the bus.
