Message from the Superintendent

The start of the 2022-2023 school year came with a renewed energy and enthusiasm. With the relaxed COVID-19 rules and regulations, the district was eager to provide a sense of normalcy for our students, faculty, and staff.

On Wednesday, August 31, and Thursday, September 1, the district held Superintendent's Conference Days to finalize our preparations for the 2022-2023 school year. This year, as part of my "Welcome Back" message for our faculty and staff, I discussed how a person's memories play an important role in their psychological well-being. Specifically, I outlined how our memories contribute to our ability to imagine future events and allows us to mentally exercise different strategies in order to work through potential outcomes. Likewise, how memories can help us cope, decrease worrying about upcoming events, and give us a sense of who we are. Our past, present, and future are all linked by memories.

I asked our faculty and staff to reflect on their past experiences as a student and what memories, positive or negative, remain with them. For many of us, when we remember our elementary years, we fondly recall the classroom birthday parties, holiday celebrations, field trips, assemblies, field days, and other special events. When we think back to our middle and high school years, we remember sports and extracurricular activities, dances, the prom, and pep-rallies. Unfortunately, for many of our students, their memories of school over the past two years include mask mandates, mandatory quarantines, virtual learning, limited extracurricular activities, and social distancing. As a parent and Superintendent, these are not the memories I want for our students.

This year I am challenging our faculty and staff to provide the best educational experience possible for our students. I want our district to be a district that focuses on the overall student experience. Collaborating to create and maintain an environment where students have a positive and uplifting experience; an environment where students want to come to school and create positive, life-long memories. I appreciate this is not an easy task and will not happen overnight. However, I firmly believe if we work together and cognitively focus our efforts, we can provide each student with the best educational experience possible, and provide a life-time of positive memories.

When our students reflect on their experience at Hartford, I want them to remember the adults who worked for the school and made long lasting positive impressions:

- The bus driver who said good morning with a smile every day
- The cafeteria worker who knew you by name and what meals you liked
- The cleaner who helped you open your locker when it was jammed every day, or when you forgot your combination after the Christmas recess
- The guidance counselor who always encouraged you
- The teacher who listened
- The coach who pushed you to work harder and do better

Yes, the curriculum will be engrained, but it is the memories of our school experience that will last.

I am extremely proud to work for and represent the Hartford Central School District. It is my honor to work with our faculty and staff and to shape, mold, and cultivate our students. I truly believe that Hartford CSD is a community of educators and I am extremely proud to be a member of this team.



HARTFORD STUDENTS TAKE THE LEAD

Area students took the lead in planning the 2022 WSWHE BOCES Student Leadership Conference held Wednesday, November 16, at the Six Flags Great Escape Lodge and Indoor Waterpark. The conference was organized by a committee of students from Fort Ann, Fort Edward, Granville, Hartford, and Whitehall and advised by Hartford CSD's Middle/High School Principal Shelley Dupuis.

Hartford students on the planning committee were Lilly Stokowski, Raeghan Liebig, Jesse Baker, and Nathan Fiske. They were joined at the conference by Hartford students Lukas DeCota, John Gauthier, Hanna Gibson, Silver Stewart, and Gabriel Stockowksi.

The entire conference was planned and executed from start to finish by the students. Planning began in the spring with the selection of students who have demonstrated leadership, academic excellence, and are positive role models for their peers. The committee chose a theme and selected a keynote speaker. This year's theme was Students Mature In Leadership Experience (SMILE) featuring motivator and comedian, Chris Bowers, who has presented in 42 states and to over two million people throughout his career. Mr. Bowers speaks to audiences about the power they have to take risks, and have confidence in themselves. He uses humor to build camaraderie with students so he can encourage them to overcome their fear of failure and fear of what others may think of them. He emphasizes positive ways of dealing with frustration and conflict resolution.

The table seating was purposely arranged for students to break away from the comfort of friends and familiarity and connect students from other districts. The student activities included a Chris Bowers version of "Rock, Paper, Scissors" and then "Getting to Know You Jenga." The students also learned the importance of flexibility, as the inclement weather caused a later start, which required the schedule of events to be modified. Additionally, several school districts expected to attend had to cancel due to school closings. However, in the words earlier from the keynote speaker, Chris Bowers, the students smiled and adapted.

BACK PACK PROGRAM

With food costs rising, our backpack program continues to support our students in food-insecure homes with nutritious, child friendly meals on weekends, when other supplemental food programs are not available. Each bag contains approximately ten different purchased foods designed to provide nutrition and calories for the children over the weekend. These are kid-friendly, shelf-stable foods that require no preparation or refrigeration. Children can just “open and eat” without adult supervision.

Our backpack program is run in conjunction with the Regional Food Bank of Northeastern New York. There has been a generous outpouring of support for the initiative that includes donations from faculty and staff, community members, HCS retired teachers, Hartford Food Pantry, Hartford UP Church, Hartford UMC, Hartford Ridge Riders, many of our school student clubs, and the Adirondack League.

Winter Safety Tips

1. Never play on snow banks on or near the road.
2. Never build snow forts or snow tunnels.
3. Never sled on snow banks or hills near the road.
4. Never assume ponds, rivers, or lakes are frozen even if they appear to be.
5. Dress properly. Wear bright clothing. Hats, winter coats and boots will keep you warm and safe from frost bite. Be sure to tuck in loose clothing such as scarves and strings.
6. Play outside with at least one other person. Be sure to answer adults/siblings/friends if they call for you.

Winter School Bus Safety Tips

1. Allow extra time to get to your bus stop.
2. Wear bright clothing so the bus driver can see you in the early morning and late evening.
3. Stand away from where the bus stops. Buses need extra room to stop when there is snow and ice.
4. Don't play in the snow while waiting for the bus.
5. Don't slide on the snow or ice in driveways or on the street.
6. Don't push or shove around the bus.
